

Passport Cover

Materials

Finished size, folded: $5\frac{1}{2}$ " × $3\frac{1}{2}$ "

- Soft-bodied, acrylic textile paint (I used PROFab Pearlescent Paint.)
- Stencil brush or sponge
- Stencils
- Fabric, 2 rectangles, each
 6" x 12½"
- Lightweight, non-fusible interfacing, 5½" × 12" (I used Pellon® 910.)
- Thread, 40–60 wt., color to contrast with fabric and paint
- Point turner
- Free-motion foot

Instructions

All seam allowances are 1/4".

- Use soft-bodied, acrylic paint and a stencil brush or sponge to stencil 1 of the fabric rectangles for the outside cover of your passport. Allow the paint to dry.
- 2. Center and pin the interfacing to the wrong side of the other fabric rectangle. Machine baste the interfacing to the fabric, about 1/4" inside the edge of the interfacing.
- **3.** With right sides together, pin the outside to the interior with the interfacing on top.
- Stitch around the perimeter, just outside the edge of the interfacing. Leave 3" open for turning.
- 5. Clip each corner and turn the cover right side out. Push the corners out with a point turner. Press, turning in the raw edges of the opening. Remove the basting stitches. The passport cover now measures 5½" × 12".
- 6. Put a free-motion foot on your machine and lower your feed dogs.



From the front, free-motion stitch over the entire surface, making sure to stitch over the folded edges of the opening to secure them.

- 7. Fold the piece in half to 5½" × 6". Fold under 2¼" on each end to form sleeves to hold the passport in place. (It should now measure roughly 5½" × 3½".) Press. Place your passport in the cover to check the fit when the passport is open.
- 8. Put the straight foot on your machine, raise the feed dogs, and edgestitch the top and bottom folds down to form the sleeves.
- Slide in your passport and book your next trip! [■]
